Let's Make New Friends at PALS!

Are you a new student at PALS? Is this session your first time at PALS? If you feel strange or unfamiliar, it's good for you to make new friends at PALS. If you don't know how you can make new friends at PALS, there are two basic ways to find friends.

You can make new friends at PALS when you attend orientation before beginning classes the first week of the session. If you want to make new friends at orientation, you can first look for a familiar face to you. Many students come together at PALS from each other's countries, so you can find some students who have an appearance like you. Next, if you find them, you can approach them and ask where they come from. Then introduce yourself and tell them where you come from. Make small talk and keep on smiling. That will give them a good impression of you. Finally, you can check each other's schedules and share information about classes. Checking schedules is very important because some of the students who have totally different classes are very hard to see during the session. At orientation, you can make friends who have friends from other countries and so you get to meet many others. Now if you want to improve relationships with them and want to make new friends in the same class, the first week of the session is very important. First, you can ask them about your homework and do homework together. You and your friend are just students to learn English, so if you don't understand about the homework, share information with each other. If you live in the dormitory, it's easy to do homework.

You can make appointments for lunch next. If you have someone you want to have lunch with, ask them like this, "Would you like to have lunch together?" Probably they will welcome you and want to join you. Finally, share your feelings or information about your classes. Talk about how your class was or what you learned. It will offer a chance to make conversation with your friends. It is an important thing that you have to make them feel comfortable and cooperate during the first week.

Most new students at PALS feel strange or unfamiliar before beginning classes. Therefore don't be afraid to approach them. Just enjoy to make friends from each other's countries. It will give you confidence and a comfortable feeling during your session. It is time to be a good person to your international friends. Good luck.
